General Election: November 8th

The State of Michigan will hold a General Election on Tuesday, November 8, 2022. Polls will be open from 7:00 am – 8:00 pm. The City of Gibraltar has two precincts, both of which vote at the Gil Talbert Community Center, located at 29340 S. Gibraltar Rd.

Absentee ballots are available for this election. Qualified voters who have requested to be on the permanent absentee voter list have been mailed their ballot applications. In order to receive a ballot, absentee ballot applications *must* be signed and returned.

Ballots can only be picked up by the voter, otherwise, they will be mailed to you. Ballots can be returned by mail, handed in-person during City Hall operating hours, or placed in the Ballot Drop Box located just outside the front door. In order to be counted, absentee ballots must be returned by 8:00 p.m. on Election Day, November 8, 2022.



If wish to vote absentee, please contact our Clerk, Katie Tomasik, at 734-676-3900 ext. 225 or come to City Hall Monday – Friday, 8:00 am – 4:00 pm. The Clerk's office will be open **Saturday, November 5, 2022, from 8:00 am – 4:00 pm** for absentee ballots and voter registrations. Saturday, November 5th, is the last date you may obtain an absentee ballot to vote bring home with you. The last day to request an absentee ballot is Monday, November 7th; however, the ballot must be voted in-person at City Hall. Absentee ballots will only be issued in emergency situations on Election Day.

If you are interested in working as an election inspector at either the August or November election, please contact our Clerk, Katie Tomasik, to request more information on applying to do so.

Year in Review

The city has accomplished some wonderful things the following year, and all during the transitioning of new staff. We wanted to take a moment to recognize those accomplishments, some of which include infrastructure projects, planning, team building and community engagement

Our city is doubling down on its commitment to improve and repair our sanitary, storm and water mains. This fall, Granite Inliner will resume work on repairing our sanitary sewer system, which is all due to the generous residents who approved the latest milage proposal last November. Previously completed portions of this project have already benefited the city in decreased flows to our sewer plant, reducing total costs. Furthermore, our Downtown Development Authority (DDA) is re-certifying their 20-year plan, which will assist the city in establishing a full drinking water redundancy along Middle Gibraltar Road. This critical piece of infrastructure will provide enhanced security to fresh and safe drinking water.

The DDA, which focuses on utilizing tax money for community development and engagement, continues to assist in providing extravaganzas to our city. Events such as the Fourth of July Festival & Fireworks and the Christmas Parade & Tree Lighting are examples of beloved events sponsored by the DDA. For 2022, they have funded a brand-new Christmas tree which was planted by the Boblo Pavilion to be lit for the first time December 3rd.

We are also excited to announce the city has acquired a new parcel of land for future park development. This was funded by a first ever Annual Mayor's Golf Cup. This successful event would not have been achieved without the support from our local businesses, partners, Gibraltar/Rockwood Rotary, Recreation Commission and citizens alike.

To meet goals within departments, the Fire Department was outfitted with a new ambulance and the Police Department received two new patrol cruisers. Additionally, the Department of Public Works has ordered a dump truck and will be receiving an upgrade to our current 13-year-old water van for day-to-day operations. As a capstone to this year, the city's Master Plan has been redeveloped and is near completion.

All of this work has been a culmination of past and present staff. Many of our friends at City Hall have changed faces this year; our Police Chief Matt Lawyer turned his badge over to Chief Richard Tanguay, Clerk Tomasik dutifully stepped into Clerk Lehr's shoes, and Fire Chief William Cain has kept our citizens attended to through his leadership in the Fire Department. We also have a new face in the City Hall front office, as Mary Gerow replaced Jackie Lennen last October. All have done an amazing job in their new roles and have made this transition of staff very smooth.



This brief article is just the tip of the iceberg. We are happy to end the year together as we anticipate good news on a State of Michigan grant application for more infrastructure replacement. We look forward to continuing to improve Gibraltar and serving you!


Halloween Trick-or-Treating: Monday, Oct. 31st

New Online Billing System and Website

The city now offers paperless billing for water bills! We have partnered with a company that allows residents to register for personal bill-pay accounts. These personal accounts offer a wide range of personalized options such as:

- Paperless billing and due date reminders
- ACH payments and auto-pay
 - o Onetime payment \$1.95 & auto pay .50 cents
- Debit/Credit payments (3.25% fee)
- Text pay and text reminders
- Scheduled payments

Residents will also be able to view and pay their tax bills online. However, per the State of Michigan, it is unlawful to send tax bills via paperless billing. You may view your bill online, but a hard copy will still be sent to either you or your mortgage company.

There are several ways to sign up for this new service. You may email Chelsea Johnson or you may register for yourself when you pay your bill via the City of Gibraltar website portal. (cjohnson@cityofgibraltar.net)

Lead Line Replacement

Per State of Michigan requirements, the city has begun working to document and replace all lead water service lines in the community. As a result, you may receive (or have already received) a letter notifying you that your residence has been identified for inspection to help meet this effort. These are brief, visual inspections that should not take more than a few minutes of your time. These allow the city to record the type of water service material present in your home.

Door-to-door inspections will be made intermittently throughout the year. A City of Gibraltar DPW employee will identify themselves to you and conduct the inspections. All identified lead-line connections will be scheduled for future replacement at no cost to you. Your cooperation and understanding in this matter are greatly appreciated.



Chipping is done every Tuesday by our DPW (with overflow into Wednesday). Tree branches for chipping should be left as long as possible, with the larger end of the branch facing towards the road in a neat, uniform pile. **The chipping service is not for trees cut down/trimmed by a hired contractor.** Small branches and limbs should be placed in yard waste bags.

If your trash can is broken by Priority Waste, please visit City Hall to complete a Garbage Can Claim form. We ask that you fill out the form and include pictures of the broken can if possible. City Hall will submit the claim on your behalf once completed. A copy of the form is also attached to the back of this newsletter.

Emergency Warning Sirens

With the upgraded technology available there will be two different distinct tones depending on the type of emergency for the siren located at the pump house. The siren located at the pump house will emit a Fast Wail Tone in the event of a Lakeshore Flooding Emergency when the lake level reaches 72" above low water datum and a Steady Tone in the event of a severe weather emergency such as a Tornado Warning. The Emergency Warning Siren located across from the modular home community will only emit a steady tone in the event of a severe weather emergency due to the fact that Lakeshore Flooding is not an immediate concern for that area. Both Sirens will be tested the last Wednesday of the month at 10:00 am in conjunction with the Fermi Warning Siren. The new Emergency Warning Sirens replaced the city's old warning siren that failed and due to the age of the siren it was unable to be repaired.



Water & Sewer Rates

On an annual basis, while going over the next fiscal year budget, water rates are determined. Factors that go into determining the water and sewer rates are:

- Increases imposed by Great Lakes Water Authority
- Increases imposed by SHVUA to treat City Waste Water
- SHVUA cost share adjustments imposed on each member community based on usage
- Equipment Costs (vector truck, water meter reading software, pumps, etc.)
- Expected Water Usage by the Community
- Water and Sewer Capital Improvement Costs

Sewer rates were last raised in 2014. SHVUA costs have greatly increased over this time. Operating costs alone have increased by approximately 9% per year. Due to this, sewer rates were increased by \$1.66 April 2022 and .20 cents July 2022, for a total rate of **\$13.96** per 1,000 gallons.

Likewise, water rates were increased by \$0.24 in April 2022 and .20 In July 2022. This equates to a total of **\$8.48** per 1,000 gallons. This is due to increases imposed by Great Lakes Water Authority as well as an increased cost for Equipment Maintenance and Water Quality Testing.

An additional \$1.00 was added on top of this by way of the infrastructure millage which passed November 2nd. This charge appears on your bill as “CI” and is \$1.00/1,000 gallons.

As mentioned above, water rates are reviewed annually to determine if they are adequately set to sustain the system. Water and Sewer rates are set accordingly to provide adequate revenues to cover all system expenses and liabilities as well as maintain proper cash reserves necessary to provide a high-level of service to the customer.

REMINDER:

PICK UP YOUR FLOOD EMERGENCY CARD

The City would like to remind residents of the requirement to pick up their “Flood Cards” from the Gibraltar Police Department, if they have not already done so. The Police Station is located within City Hall at 29450 Munro Ave.

This initiative is in response to current high-water issues associated with elevated lake levels. Residents are required to show these cards in their vehicles during flood events in order to gain access to the city. Many long-term residents are familiar with these cards as they were used during previous flood events. Each household is allotted two flood cards and will have numbers that will be assigned to your street address.

The purpose of these cards is to eliminate non-residents from gaining access to the town during flood events. During these events eliminating non-resident traffic is essential to preserving public safety and private property. Checkpoints will exist at the four entrance points to the town. Cards will be able to be hung from your rearview mirror to be highly visible at City Checkpoints to prevent traffic back-ups. For residents who may not have a card, drivers licenses indicating residency can be used to gain access.

Residents of Horse Island will receive a different color card. It is essential that traffic is limited to only Horse Island residents during a flood event.

In preparation of potential flooding, the City has made available sand bags free of charge for interested residents. Bags can be picked up in the vestibule of City Hall.

POLICE and FIRE

Residents are reminded that City policy requires that warning sirens sound during a flood event every hour whenever lake levels reach 72 inches. Testing of the sirens is performed every last Wednesday of the month at or around 10:00 a.m.

Tax Bill Information (2022/2023)

2022 Summer taxes were mailed out **July 1st** and due without penalty **August 31st**. **Winter 2022** taxes will be mailed out **December 1st** and will be due **February 14th**. A 4% penalty will be added to the total after the due dates have passed. If you have an escrow account with your mortgage company, a tax bill will be sent to them and you will not receive one. If you believe you should receive a tax bill and did not get one, please call City Hall at 734-676-3900.

As of March 1, 2023 all unpaid 2022 real property taxes have been marked delinquent and are only payable with the Wayne County Treasurer's Office. You can view and pay delinquent property taxes at pta.waynecounty.com/ or by calling **(313) 224-5990**. Personal property and Meadowlands taxes are always payable at City Hall and do not get sent to Wayne County.

Gibraltar Infrastructure Millage

In the General Election on November 2, 2021 voters passed the Gibraltar Infrastructure Millage. This millage is at the rate of 2.5 mils for 5 years and will take effect on the Summer 2022 tax bill. This millage is a dedicated millage that will be used to repair, replace and maintain our underground infrastructure which will include water, stormwater and wastewater networks.

This is a tandem approach with our water account, as the presented rate increase of \$1.00 per unit will be going into effect for further capital infrastructure funding. As many know, infrastructure all around the county is becoming overwhelmed and is in need of repair.

The City would like to thank you for your proactive and perceptive support by putting your community first and taking the necessary steps to help fix the issues before they become emergencies.

Water Department

The Gibraltar Water Department runs on a quarterly basis. Water bills are read via a handheld computer that electronically collects reads which are uploaded to a program. Bills are generated and mailed in the months of **January, April, July and October**. The bills are always due the 10th of the following month. If you do not receive a bill, contact City Hall for a duplicate to be mailed to you.

After the due date, a 10% penalty will be added to whatever is owed on your account. Council has adopted a policy that mandates water accounts be paid to a zero balance by the start of the next billing cycle. Thus, the Water Department adheres to a shut-off schedule which allows residents to pay down their water bills in incremental stages. Should you have questions in regards to our adopted shut-off schedule, contact Chelsea Johnson in the Water Department at 734-676-3900.

It is important that you pay close attention to the usage portion of your water bill to determine abnormalities. Water bills are billed a flat rate of \$23.04 per unit of water (1,000 gallons), so if your bill has gone up, so has your usage. The average person uses 5 units of water a quarter (ex. a household of four people should be around 20 units). If your bill seems high, checking for leaks is always a good first step. Toilets often run intermittently and have “silent” leaks. Place food dye in the tank of your toilet and if the coloring runs to the bowl, then that is an indicator that that your toilet is running. Another good trick is to check your water meter reading (by shining a flashlight on the face of the meter) and waiting a few hours without any water use and reading again. If the read has changed even slightly, then a leak is probably occurring.



Drop Box

The City Hall payment drop box is located in the traffic island across from the flag pole. Water and tax payments may be dropped for payment if you are unable to make it to City Hall during normal business hours. The drop box is checked daily. **If you forget to make a payment for water or taxes on the date it is due, anything that is in the box by 8:00am the following day will be considered as on time.**

There is a United States Postal Service mail box located in front of the Gil Talbert Community Center.

Watershed Information

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Storm drains found in our streets and yards empty into our lakes and rivers. When we fertilize our lawn we could also be fertilizing our lakes and rivers. While fertilizer is good for our lawn, it's bad for our water. Fertilizer in our lakes and rivers causes algae to grow. Algae can form large blooms and use oxygen that fish need to survive. With 1.5 million homes in Southeast Michigan, all of us need to be aware of the cumulative effects of our lawn care practices.

Here are seven simple steps you can take in your home and yard to protect our lakes and streams.

- 1. Help keep pollution out of storm drains.** Storm drains lead directly to our lakes and streams. Never dump oil, pet waste, leaves, dirty water, or anything down a storm drain. Remember, only rain in the drain.
- 2. Fertilize carefully and sparingly.** Excess fertilizer that gets into storm drains pollutes our lakes by causing large algae blooms and using up oxygen fish need to survive. Sweep excess fertilizer back onto your lawn, use a low or no phosphorus fertilizer, and have your soil tested to see what, if any, fertilizer is needed.
- 3. Carefully store and dispose of household cleaners, chemicals, and oil.** Instead of putting hazardous products like antifreeze, motor oil, and pesticides in the trash, down the storm drain, or on the ground, take them to a local hazardous waste collection day.
- 4. Clean up after your pet.** Whether on a walk or in your yard, promptly clean up after your pet. Not only will be you a good neighbor, you will also protect our water from harmful bacteria.
- 5. Practice good car care.** Consider taking your car to a car wash or washing your car on the grass.
- 6. Choose earth friendly landscaping.** Protect your pets, kids, and the environment by using pesticides sparingly. Also, water your lawn only when it needs it and choose plants native to Michigan.
- 7. Save water.** Over watering our lawns can easily carry pollution to the storm drains and to our lakes and streams. Consider using a broom instead of a hose to clean sidewalks and driveways. Direct hoses and sprinklers on the lawn, not the driveway. This will help save our lakes and streams and save you money.


